Message from Our Board Chair

This year, we celebrated a remarkable milestone: 30 years of empowering women entrepreneurs across British Columbia. From our small beginnings to a province-wide movement, WeBC's journey has generated \$1.4 billion in cumulative economic impact (see more on page 8), a testament to the vision, resilience and passion of every entrepreneur we serve.

In 2024/25, federal project investment through the Women Entrepreneurship Strategy and PacifiCan enabled us to deepen our support. This year we provided over \$3.18 million in direct and leveraged financing, sparking nearly \$50 million in local economic activity. WeBC provided over 12,000 advisory and info services, enrolled over 5,000 in our SMART online business programs and matched 335 women for a mentorship relationship. These achievements reflect the strength of our partnerships—with financial institutions, mentors, ecosystem collaborators and government agencies—united by a common goal: inclusive economic growth.

Message from Our CEO

As I look back on the 2024/25 fiscal year, I'm energized by the scale of change and the sense of purpose that carried WeBC through shifting politics, economic uncertainty, and urgent calls for inclusion. We refined our strategic plan to look forward to the next phase of our organization and to intensify our commitment to women entrepreneurs—those who power most consumer spending and are poised to steward nearly \$4 trillion in assets by 2028, yet still face gaps in support. One truth became undeniable: women entrepreneurs are ready to reshape Canada's economy.

Last November in Victoria, BC, on Women's Entrepreneurship Day, we kicked off our 30th anniversary celebrations. From Prince George and Kelowna to Vancouver, we marked three decades of championing women in business across BC—and reflected on the fact that, until 1988, a woman still needed a male co-signer to secure a loan. Only one generation has ever enjoyed full access to capital.

The work ahead remains urgent. Systemic barriers to funding, networks, and visibility still hold women-led ventures back. Unlocking their potential isn't just right—it's essential for Canada's competitiveness. When women build and grow businesses, they create jobs, boost tax revenues, and fuel prosperity in every community.

Executive Summary

We Are Community Connectors

After three decades in this space, WeBC has built a far-reaching network of champions, mentors, partners, funders, and advocates throughout BC and beyond.

We share these numbers to show how the ecosystem we've built has resulted in incredible reach and impact for women entrepreneurs across BC, and to highlight the foundation for our next chapter: increasing access to capital and expanding economic opportunities for women entrepreneurs.





Expanded support for women entrepreneurs through collaboration

As a values-driven organization, we align ourselves with partners that deliver impactful programs in an inclusive environment. Over the past two years, as part of our "Capital, Community, Capacity (C3)" Project, we've invested more than \$1.2M back into our community through partnerships and contracts, hiring 58 BC-based businesses to help create and distribute programming. In 2024/25 alone, we recruited 78 volunteers who donated 1,087 hours. These partnerships continue to expand the depth and reach of resources available to women business owners.

Increased access to capital for viable, scalable businesses

WeBC helps women become bankable by empowering them to build strong, fundable businesses through mentorship and education. We offer business loans of up to \$150,000 through our core program and serve as the BC Loan Fund Partner for the \$34M WEOC National Loan Fund. We also work with financial institutions to create a more inclusive lending system—as an example, our partnership with Vancity has delivered over \$27 million to women entrepreneurs across BC since 2021.

In 2025, WeBC celebrates 30 years of supporting women entrepreneurs across British Columbia. What began as a regional initiative has grown into a province-wide force for inclusive economic development—helping thousands of women start, grow, and sustain businesses through financing, mentorship, training, and advisory services.

These numbers reflect more than activity—they represent transformation. Our five-year impact study shows that WeBC's support leads to measurable economic growth. Between 2019 and 2024, \$8.5 million in loans generated \$223 million in incremental revenue and 3,700 person-years of employment. Every dollar we lend creates \$15.44 in economic impact.

WeBC's model addresses persistent gaps in capital and support—especially for underserved entrepreneurs in rural, newcomer, Indigenous, and equity-deserving communities. Through mentorship, training, and advisory services, we help women build strong businesses and become bankable—ready to access capital, scale sustainably, and reinvest in their communities. Sixty-nine percent of our loan clients say their WeBC loan helped them access additional financing.

This impact is made possible through long-term federal investment. With funding from PacifiCan and the Government of Canada's Women Entrepreneurship Strategy, WeBC has become a trusted partner in delivering inclusive economic growth. Their investment in our success is an investment in women—and in the future of Canada's economy.

Community Grown

WeBC is a not-for-profit that offers a range of business support services to help women entrepreneurs grow and thrive. We've been supporting women entrepreneurs for over three decades, so we have an unparalleled understanding of the approaches to business and financing that work for women business owners.



Business loans to help women start, buy and grow their businesses

Since we approve loans based on the viability of the business plan, many women qualify with us even if they haven't with other lenders. Offering wrap-around supports, including advisory services, mentoring and training, we're long-term partners in our clients' success.



Convenient, affordable training to fill skill gaps

With our skills development programs, women gain practical skills they can implement immediately. We focus on the essential topics that women need to run a successful business, from marketing to operations and cash flow management.



Peer support systems that support and inspire

Our mentoring programs connect new business owners with experienced entrepreneurs who share their hard-earned knowledge. With a fresh perspective, our mentees gain the clarity to focus on what really matters, and feel more confident making decisions.



Complimentary advisory services to navigate the journey

Women can receive one-on-one support when they need it. Our professional Business Advisors have experience and training across a broad range of business areas, from strategic planning to social procurement, and many are entrepreneurs themselves!

Fostering Inclusive Economic Growth

Special Project

Inclusive lending isn't just equitable—it's a smart economic move. Women entrepreneurs consistently outperform national averages in business survival, revenue growth, and job creation, yet they remain underrepresented in lending portfolios. Financial institutions are missing out on a significant opportunity to grow their impact and their bottom line.

Through the "Fostering Inclusive Economic Growth" initiative, WeBC is leading efforts to change this. We're consulting directly with financial institutions, ecosystem partners, and entrepreneurs to identify practical ways to build a stronger pipeline of inclusive lending. Our goal is to equip lenders with the tools and insights they need to expand their portfolios and better serve underrepresented entrepreneurs—starting with changes they can make within existing systems.

To inform this work, we hired The Thick Data Company to survey 295 women entrepreneurs and conduct 36 stakeholder interviews to understand the barriers and opportunities from multiple perspectives. These findings will shape a toolkit of resources and strategies that WeBC will use to advocate for inclusive lending and support financial institutions in taking action.

The full report will be released in 2026, and we'll continue the conversation by hosting a provincial conference—the Inclusive Growth Summit—in Vancouver to bring together financial leaders and spark new ideas for inclusive portfolio development.

Capital, Community, Capacity (C3) Project

Special Project

The C3 Project gained significant momentum this year. Building on the foundational work from year one, we activated partnerships across the country, expanded our programming, and reached more women entrepreneurs than ever before.

This year, we added two new initiatives:

- Community-Based Mentorship: We partnered with 7 Chambers around BC to bring our Peer Mentoring Model[™] to local communities (see p. 20).
- Networking & Capacity-Building Events:
 In collaboration with partners across
 Canada, we hosted events that brought together over 1,600 women to connect, learn, and grow their businesses.

We also continued to offer:

- SMART Programs: Self-paced learning modules focused on key topics for women's startup and growth (learn more on p. 26).
- Growth Mentorship: Supporting growth-oriented entrepreneurs across Canada through our proven Peer Mentoring Model[™] (learn more on p. 27).
- Fireside Chats: Free, virtual sessions featuring BC women sharing their experiences and insights on scaling a business.

Through this project, WeBC has reinvested more than \$1.2M into our communities over the past two years via partnerships and contracts—hiring 58 BC-based businesses to help create and deliver programming. In 2024/25 alone, we engaged 78 volunteers who contributed 1,087 hours to support women entrepreneurs. These investments reflect our commitment to building capacity within the ecosystem and ensuring that support is both locally delivered and nationally connected.

In Year 2 alone, we supported 9,218 women entrepreneurs—far exceeding our target of 1,161. Of those clients, 2,138 identified as underserved or intersectional (target: 267), and 2,328 were located in rural or remote communities (target: 207).

Thanks to the proven success of the C3 Project, WeBC received additional funding from ISED to continue the initiative into 2025/26. We're proud of the growing impact and look forward to building on this momentum in the year ahead.

Regional Collaborations

WeBC is committed to making sure women across BC can easily find the support they need to start, grow, or strengthen their businesses. We believe there's no wrong doorway—whether they connect with us directly or through one of our partners, women should be able to access high-quality programs and resources that meet them where they are.

Since we're not a membership-based organization, our focus is on building connections across the ecosystem. Each region has its own unique needs, and we rely on local champions to help us understand what matters most in their communities. This year, our team supported, sponsored, spoke at, or attended 192 events across the province, helping us build relationships and tailor our programming to reflect local priorities.

Through these collaborations, we're able to extend the reach and relevance of our services, offering a place-based approach that strengthens the overall ecosystem for women entrepreneurs in BC.

Vancouver Island

WeBC is proud to support the vibrant entrepreneurial community on Vancouver Island. This year, we connected with over 4,000 women-owned businesses in the region, helping them access tailored resources, mentorship, and training through local partnerships.

Event Spotlight Connecting Women in STEM on Vancouver Island

In partnership with the City of Victoria, Island Women in Science and Technology (iWIST), and VIATEC, WeBC hosted "Connect and Grow: Gathering Women in STEM and Entrepreneurship." The event welcomed 102 women for an evening of meaningful dialogue, networking, and resource sharing. Attendees explored tailored supports for women in STEM and entrepreneurship and connected with peers and organizations through a curated tradeshow designed to foster collaboration and personal growth.

Northern BC

By partnering with regional organizations, we've increased our support for northern entrepreneurs while helping our partners increase their capacity and breadth of programs.

Program Spotlight

Elevating Northern Entrepreneurship with University of Northern British Columbia (UNBC)

We partnered with UNBC to host two events that brought together aspiring entrepreneurs, support organizations, and ecosystem leaders to strengthen entrepreneurship in Northern BC.



Entrepreneurship Night welcomed 65 participants, including students and early-stage entrepreneurs, for an evening of inspiration, networking, and resource sharing. The following day, 42 attendees joined the Northern Regional Round Table, a full-day event focused on inclusive entrepreneurship, regional collaboration, and action planning.

Participants left with new connections, practical insights, and a shared commitment to building a stronger entrepreneurial ecosystem in the North.

Lower Mainland

WeBC connected with more than 11,700 women entrepreneurs in the Lower Mainland this year. Through partnerships with community-based organizations, we're helping women navigate challenges, access tailored support, and contribute to a more inclusive economy.

Vancouver benefits from a diverse ecosystem and is home to many organizations that serve equity-deserving groups. By collaborating with these partners, we combine our gender-lens approach with their deep understanding of community needs—working together to grow a more equitable and resilient entrepreneurial landscape.

Event Spotlight

Supporting Financial Confidence for Black Women in Business

WeBC was proud to sponsor and present a workshop at the Black Women's Exhibit and Professional Convention in Vancouver, hosted by the Black Women Business Network (BWBN). The event drew over 1,000 attendees and 93 exhibitors, with 17 women participating in WeBC's workshop, Leveraging Capital for Your Business: Right Time, Right Fit. Focused on financial empowerment, the session helped women explore funding strategies tailored to their business goals and growth stage.

WeBC now connects with over 1,500 women entrepreneurs in the Cariboo and Kootenays—a 60% increase in engagement in this region over the previous year. This growth reflects the region's deep commitment to collaboration, where women actively seek out opportunities to learn, grow, and lead. With strong support from Community Futures and local Chambers of Commerce, the region fosters a culture of mentorship and mutual support.

Event Spotlight

Growing Together in the Kootenays: Building Local Connections for Women Entrepreneurs

In September 2024, WeBC co-hosted WeGrowTogether events in Nelson and Trail, bringing together women business owners and local support organizations for connection, learning, and community building. Hosted by our Regional Ambassador for the Kootenays, Fern Sabo, the events welcomed 74 attendees and focused on fostering relationships and raising awareness of available support in the region.

To ensure the events reflected local needs and opportunities, we partnered with the Nelson & District Chamber of Commerce, Trail & District Chamber of Commerce, Community Futures

Central Kootenay, Community Futures South Kootenay, and Futurpreneur. Attendees heard from local entrepreneurs, explored available programs, and built meaningful connections with peers and support organizations.



We need community, and we need to rally behind this movement of women creating businesses that work for them. I know what it's like to feel completely isolated, like you don't have the support that you need. You need your support system and your community to rely on—and that's what WeBC provides. This year, we connected with over 3,200 women business owners throughout the Okanagan—offering mentorship, training, and updates on local programs through WeBC and our partners. From startup support to growth-focused resources, we continue to strengthen our presence in the region and build relationships that help women entrepreneurs succeed.

Program Spotlight

Building Networks for Women in Male-Dominated Industries with Okanagan College

Okanagan College's peer mentoring programs created space for women in the beverage and construction industries to connect, learn, and lead. These weren't typical business sessions—they included field trips to wineries and workplaces, where participants gained handson insights and sparked new ideas by seeing each other's operations up close. The programs fostered deep peer connections, practical resource sharing, and a sense of community in industries where women are often underrepresented. Participants left with renewed confidence, actionable strategies, and a shared commitment to lifting each other up.

Expanding Beyond BC

Program Spotlight

Mentoring Connections Coast-to-Coast with the PEI Women's Business Association

WeBC collaborated with the PEI Business Women's Association (PEIBWA) to support women entrepreneurs through a peer mentoring cohort that fostered connection, problem-solving, and shared growth. Participants met regularly to navigate business and personal challenges together, offering each other practical advice and encouragement.

Following the cohort, PEIBWA hosted an in-person event to celebrate the power of mentorship and highlight the real-world impact of the program. Mentees shared their experiences and outcomes, and a panel discussion explored how peer support can drive meaningful change for women in business.

The stories shared were powerful. One mentee streamlined her operations and caregiving responsibilities with peer-suggested tools and staffing support. Another launched a retail space for local artists after solving technical and logistical hurdles with help from her group. Others refined their service offerings, built referral networks, and expanded their reach—some securing media coverage, hiring staff, or launching new ventures.



Provincial Collaborations

WeBC is proud to collaborate with organizations that serve women entrepreneurs across British Columbia. This year, we supported province-wide programming that brought women together virtually from every region, fostering connection and shared learning. We also invested in key partners who distributed funding to local communities—empowering them to design events and programs that reflect their unique needs. These collaborations extend our reach and ensure that support is both accessible in all areas of the province while remaining locally relevant.



LIFT Collective Mentorship

Program Spotlight

Rooted in Culture, Rising Together with Indigenous LIFT Collective Mentorship

Through our partnership with Indigenous LIFT Collective, 16 Indigenous women entrepreneurs participated in the LIFT Circle—a 7-week mentoring program rooted in Indigenous ways of teaching.

Led by an Indigenous woman entrepreneur, each session began and ended in ceremony, creating a safe and culturally grounded space for connection and growth. Guest speakers, including Raven Indigenous Capital Partners and WeBC, shared pathways to funding and business development. Participants left feeling supported, inspired, and more confident in their entrepreneurial journeys.

Community Futures

Program Spotlight

Reaching Rural Entrepreneurs Across BC with Community Futures

Through our partnership with Community Futures (CF), WeBC supported two initiatives that brought women together to learn, connect, and grow: International Women's Day (IWD) events and the Women Entrepreneur Traveling Clinic. Together, these programs reached 707 women across 20 communities in BC, through 11 unique CF partnerships.

The IWD events welcomed 571 women to hear from local entrepreneurs, share experiences, and build meaningful connections. These gatherings sparked conversations about leadership, gender equity, and business growth—reminding attendees that entrepreneurship thrives in community.

The Traveling Clinic offered personalized support to 136 women through workshops and drop-in sessions. By meeting women where they were, the sessions lowered barriers to participation and created space for deeper, one-on-one conversations. Women left with practical tools, renewed confidence, and a stronger sense of belonging.

Program Spotlight

Community-Based Mentorship with Chambers of Commerce

In partnership with seven Chambers of Commerce across BC, WeBC supported 56 women entrepreneurs through locally hosted peer mentoring groups. These in-person cohorts helped participants build strong, regionally rooted support systems—connecting with others who understand the unique opportunities and challenges of doing business in their communities.

With the support of their local Chambers, mentees shared resources, formed strategic alliances, and gained confidence in their business decisions:

- In Prince Rupert, the group created a safe space for storytelling and emotional support.
- In Chilliwack, mentees refined operations and clarified growth strategies.
- In Kelowna, participants described the experience as "having a village."

These stories show how place-based mentorship can spark transformation, foster collaboration, and strengthen local ecosystems.

Access to Capital

Fueling Growth for Women Entrepreneurs

Access to capital isn't just a transaction—it's a turning point. For many women entrepreneurs, securing financing is the difference between a business idea and a thriving enterprise. That's why WeBC's loans program is at the heart of our work.

WeBC offers business loans of up to \$150,000, including our Equal Access to Capital (EAC) program, which provides unsecured loans up to \$50,000. We take a holistic approach—evaluating business viability, not just formulas—allowing us to support a diverse range of women-owned businesses, including those often overlooked by traditional lenders.

We're also proud to be the BC Loan Fund Partner for the WEOC National Loan Fund, a \$34 million federal initiative that helps women entrepreneurs across Canada start, scale, and sustain their businesses. We prepare women to apply for unsecured loans and provide wraparound support throughout their journey.

In 2024/25, WeBC received 96 loan applications through our core program, approving 29 loans and disbursing \$1.56 million, while leveraging an additional \$1.62 million in funding. Combined with the WEOC program, these lending options give women greater access to capital—with fewer barriers and more support.

We work closely with each client to help them build their funding puzzle—whether that means preparing a strong application, connecting with other funders, or advocating for their access to capital. Our goal is to help women secure the financing they need to build strong, sustainable businesses.

Getting loans from traditional lenders such as banks for a business of our size is virtually impossible. The funds from WeBC allowed us to invest in equipment to help increase our production capacity thereby reducing our labour cost."

In addition to our core loan program, WeBC partners with other lenders to lessen their risk, while ensuring their loan clients get the support they need to move forward with additional funds and wrap-around services provided by WeBC. In addition to the program highlighted below, we work with Community Futures, BDC, RBC, credit unions and others on joint loans for specific clients.

Partner Spotlight

Vancity

Women Entrepreneurs Program (WEP)

The Women Entrepreneurs Program offers a line of credit up to \$25K or a business loan up to \$250K from Vancity, paired with wraparound support from WeBC—including mentorship, financial education, and peer connections. Since 2021, WEP has delivered over \$27M in capital to women-led businesses.

As the program has evolved to be more inclusive, Vancity removed key barriers by lowering credit score requirements and educating staff to better support applicants. As a result, hundreds of women have accessed financing, grown their businesses, and become leaders in their communities—proving that inclusive lending drives lasting economic and social impact.

Teaching Women How to Raise Venture Capital

Equity financing can enable women to leverage their resources and accelerate their business growth. Yet, globally women-led startups receive less than 3% of venture capital funding. In 2024/25, we partnered with 19 organizations across Canada on two projects to help more women access venture capital.

Thanks to funding from the Government of Canada's Inclusive Women Venture Capital Initiative, WeBC created the Investor Speak[™] program to give women the competitive advantage by teaching them how to lead the conversation with investors in a way that results in investment. Using the Investor Q&A role-play training console, women practice responding to investors' questions and receive automated, industry-agnostic feedback. Then they join weekly meetups with a small cohort to receive support on their venture capital journey.

Loan Client Story | The GOOD Chocolatier

Mara Mennicken, Vancouver

Originally from Germany, Mara Mennicken transformed a small artisan chocolate venture into The GOOD Chocolatier, a social enterprise offering ethically sourced, organic chocolate from Ecuador.

While searching for resources to support her small business, Mara discovered WeBC's free programs. She started with the WeBC Peer Mentorship Program to build her community and receive guidance from a more experienced entrepreneur.

Later that year, Mara reconnected with Melanie Rupp, WeBC Senior Director, Loans & Advisory Services, who suggested the loan program to grow her business. Initially hesitant to take out a loan, Mara was encouraged by multiple colleagues who recommended WeBC's support. WeBC's loan program has enabled her to purchase a tempering machine and chocolate grinders—critical investments that quadrupled her production capacity and allowed her to enter the Ontario market through a second distributor.

Since receiving the loan, Mara has created or maintained nine part-time and casual jobs—six held by individuals on the autism spectrumproving that inclusive hiring can drive both social impact and business growth.

WeBC continues to support Mara with one-on-one advisory support and financial tools, which give Mara the confidence and capacity to grow sustainably, while staying true to her social mission

I found my experience with WeBC amazing because I wasn't aware there was so much support. I thought it was just a loan, and then you manage how you repay it, but then you also get a financial advisor and have access to a whole team. That was such a big plus because I think even if you think you know finances, managing a loan and doing the best with it is different."





Advisory Services & Training

WeBC's Skills Development programs focus on the essential business skills women need to build and grow successful businesses. With 73% of women identifying access to networks as critical to their success, and 72% seeking skills development opportunities, our training sessions are designed to deliver both—combining practical learning with interactive formats and real-world storytellers who inspire and inform

Demand for our Advisory Services remained strong again this year. Our team held over 5,600 one-on-one meetings with women business owners, and welcomed more than 2,100 participants to our free Starting a Business Info Sessions.

Our training and advisory teams work closely together to ensure women across BC receive timely, relevant support tailored to the challenges they're facing. By aligning our programming with client needs, we help entrepreneurs build confidence and take action. Our most popular topics this year were: Selling to Government (362 registrants in 2 series); Financial Survival (319 registrants), Social Media Marketing (247 registrants); Email Marketing (235 registrants); and Business Insurance (199 registrants).

Designed to build foundational skills, SMART Programs help entrepreneurs apply key concepts to their own businesses through case studies, activities, and practical tools.

These programs have become a vital part of how we serve our clients. By addressing many of the common questions entrepreneurs bring to our advisors, SMART Programs allow us to increase our capacity for more targeted, one-on-one support.

We've made SMART Programs available to our partner organizations across Canada, helping them extend their support offerings and build capacity within their own communities. Whether someone is just starting out or looking to strengthen their business fundamentals, SMART Programs provide accessible, relevant learning that meets entrepreneurs where they are.

Growth Mentorship Programs

Our Mentoring Program connects new business owners with experienced entrepreneurs so they can gain the clarity to focus on what really matters, and build a support network to keep them accountable.

As part of our C3 project (see p. 9), we ran our popular One-to-One Mentoring program, offered Community-Based Mentorship (see p. 20), and hosted our Growth Peer Mentorship program to serve growth-oriented women entrepreneurs across the country.

Peer Groups offer feedback and fresh perspectives on women's business challenges and growth opportunities, using a solution-based approach. Sessions are guided by a Mentor who is an experienced entrepreneur, and the Mentees use action learning to problem-solve in real time. The Growth Peer Groups also work through six key topics to develop key skills for growth, including HR, operations and negotiation.

Alissa Assu, Campbell River

Alissa Assu's entrepreneurial journey has been one of passion, resilience, and a deep commitment to her community. After a successful career in sports with the Indigenous Sport, Physical Activity & Recreation Council (ISPARC), Alissa shifted her focus to entrepreneurship, opening West Coast Wildflowers in Campbell River in 2020. The boutique showcases locally-made products and amplifies the voices of BIPOC families and Canadian artisans. Along with her partner Cody Assu, she also invested in RavenSong Soap and Candles, and Bear Essential Oils, wellness brands that integrate plant medicine and Indigenous knowledge.

Despite the success of her ventures, Alissa faced challenges in scaling her businesses and navigating the financial complexities of entrepreneurship. She turned to WeBC's One-to-One Mentoring program to gain a deeper understanding of her business's financials and to access a broader network.

I wanted to take the program to understand financials better. My husband and I are building our house, making it harder for us to show we're growing."

After being matched, Alissa's mentor introduced her to valuable contacts outside her network, which helped her achieve her business goals and further her learning. The support and connections Alissa gained from the program reinforced her confidence, empowering her to pursue her goals, both big and small. The mentorship program connected Alissa with a mentor who provided invaluable guidance, not just in financial matters, but in expanding her business network.



The most valuable aspect of the program was the connections my mentor helped me make with important contacts outside of our usual circles. For many Indigenous people, our networks don't include family members who work at banks. We often discuss the challenges of launching new businesses when living in a community struggling with poverty. It's a different reality. The mentorship through WeBC helps us access those circles and resources."



Specialty Mentorship & Training Programs

In addition to our core programs, in 2024/25 we combined efforts with other organizations to deliver specialized offerings for women entrepreneurs.

Impact Toolbox Program for Social Enterprise Startups

WeBC collaborated with Impact Toolbox to bring their proven social enterprise program to women in the pre-startup phase. Through self-paced learning, expert-led coaching, and a final showcase, participants gained the tools to launch financially sustainable ventures that create meaningful change in their communities. This partnership helped aspiring entrepreneurs turn purpose-driven ideas into impactful businesses.



PARO BIZCamps and Prosper Circles

PARO is the Ontario counterpart of WeBC and they've expanded their programs across Canada. We partnered to hire Deborah Lampitt-McConnachie as a Prosper Project Coordinator and BC representative for PARO. Through this partnership, she provides support and outreach for both organizations.





Discovery Foundation's Digital Strategic Leadership Program for Tech Businesses

As an agent of the Technology Education Program (TEP), we delivered a six-month program to support women entrepreneurs as they grow their tech businesses. Mentees expanded their network while learning from an experienced leader in tech.



Loan Client Story | Sena College

Lindsey Sloan, Kelowna

As a Registered Massage Therapist (RMT) and educator, Lindsey Sloan has dedicated over 17 years to the profession. Now, she is embarking on her greatest adventure yet, opening a massage therapy school in Kelowna, Sena College.

When she decided to tackle the major undertaking of opening a school, Lindsey began looking at different loan programs. She found traditional banks and venture capitalists weren't equipped to support her financially, as funding a school presents unique challenges compared to funding a product. A colleague recommended WeBC because our eligibility criteria are more inclusive than traditional banks.

Believing in her vision, we worked alongside Lindsey to perfect her loan application. As the BC Loan Fund Partner of the WEOC National Loan Fund, we provided support at each step. Lindsey was successful in accessing the capital, which was essential to cover her start-up costs including construction permits, renovations, and essential equipment for her students. Lindsey has recently welcomed the first cohort of students in 2025, and she envisions growing a school where students thrive and develop into skilled professionals.

The establishment of Sena College addresses the growing demand for skilled massage therapists, thereby strengthening healthcare services in the community. To date, Lindsey has created or maintained 19 jobs to launch and run the college, and by training future professionals, she's helping grow the industry—creating a ripple effect as graduates move into quality jobs or launch businesses of their own.



Working with WeBC has been a fantastic experience, especially in terms of communication. Supporting women in business is so important, and it's great to see more women gaining support in areas like venture capital, which has traditionally been male-dominated. It's been wonderful to collaborate with them, and I truly appreciate the opportunity."
